- a. Why is the field white in colour?
- A. It is covered with snow.
- b. Describe the 'frosty field'.
- A. Cold and frozen stiff.
- c. Explain the last two lines.
- A. The winter will not stop him from travelling.
- C. Think and answer.
- 1. How would you describe the speaker as a person? Do you think it is possible to live a life free from material wants and desires? Explain in your own words.
